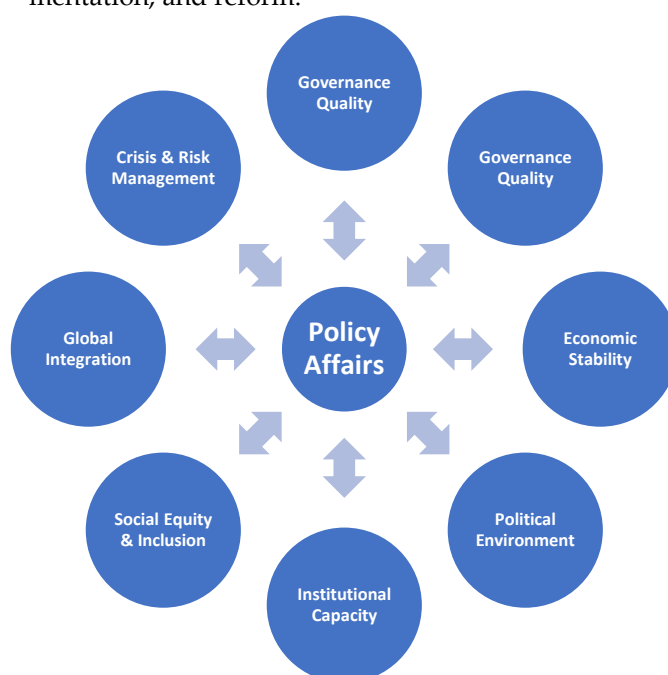


Figure 1. Connectedness of policy affairs

Figure 1 positions Policy Affairs (PA) at the center of a dynamic governance system, shaped by eight core variables that interact with it through reciprocal, two-way causal relationships. Rather than viewing policy as a linear output of political or administrative processes, the model conceptualizes policy affairs as both an outcome and a driver of broader institutional, economic, and societal conditions. This bidirectional structure reflects the reality that governance operates within feedback loops: policies influence structures and environments, while those same environments condition policy design, implementation, and reform.

Governance Quality (GQ) is among the most foundational determinants of policy outcomes. High levels of transparency, accountability, rule of law, and administrative efficiency enhance the credibility and effectiveness of policy systems. Economic Stability (ES) operates as another central structural condition. Conversely, effective policy-making contributes to economic resilience by establishing sound regulatory frameworks, promoting investment confidence, and managing public finances responsibly. The Political Environment (PE) introduces the dimension of power, legitimacy, and continuity. Political stability, legislative capacity, and constructive competition enable coherent policy development and reduce volatility in reform agendas. Institutional Capacity (IC) directly influences the operational effectiveness of policy systems. Administrative competence, professional expertise, digital infrastructure, and enforcement mechanisms determine whether

policy objectives translate into measurable outcomes. The model also incorporates Social Equity and Inclusion (SEI) to recognize that policy legitimacy depends on fairness and accessibility. Inclusive societies facilitate policy acceptance, compliance, and collaborative governance. At the same time, equitable policy frameworks reduce disparities, strengthen social cohesion, and enhance public trust. In the contemporary era, Digital Transformation (DT) plays an increasingly decisive role. Digital infrastructure and technological innovation improve service delivery, data-driven decision-making, and regulatory efficiency. However, policy frameworks themselves determine the pace and direction of digital adoption, regulate emerging technologies, and protect digital rights. Global Integration (GI) expands the scope of policy affairs beyond national borders. Trade openness, international agreements, and transnational institutions shape domestic regulatory environments and constrain policy choices. Simultaneously, domestic policy reforms influence global competitiveness, diplomatic standing, and participation in international governance regimes. This reciprocal linkage situates policy affairs within a broader global ecosystem.

Finally, Crisis and Risk Management (CRM) reflects the growing importance of resilience in governance systems. Preparedness for economic shocks, public health emergencies, climate events, and security risks influences policy credibility and institutional trust.
